Over his years with Ascension, John served as Treasurer and on the building committee when the current sanctuary was first being planned. He has also served as a trustee in the church.

John is survived by his wife, Audrey; his son, Ken; two daughters, Cindy and Roxanne; three grandsons and one great-grandchild. The memorial service for John is on May 12 at Ascension.

National projects for 2018 to 2020 were selected last June at the Al-

buquerque, New Mexico LWML convention. Over \$2 million will be dispersed to 22 projects. All funds will come from your mite box contributions.

Member Spotlight: Getting to know Organist Itichai "Itchi" Tiemsanjai



Itichai "Itchi" Tiemsanjai was born in Harbor City, lived in Hawthorne until his family moved to a home in Gardena and he has lived in that home ever since. His parents are devout Buddhists, his older sister is a Roman Catholic and his younger sister is undefined; Itchi is a new Lutheran.

Itchi is currently the Organist at Ascension, starting the position last fall. He is in training to become a Manufacturing Engineer and aims to work in Aerospace. Itchi enjoys tinkering in his home shop (machining, welding, ceramics, etc.), making long-distance international contacts on his Ham Radio and riding his motorcycle.

Itchi said the Lord has guided him through a journey of faiths (while keeping him safe). "When I was 13 my parents forced me to become an ordained Buddhist monk. Woe to me when I found out what was in store for me." After that experience, Itchi left the Buddhist faith and studied under various faiths thereafter, coming to the knowledge of Jesus Christ in high school and being baptized at age 22. He was involved with Rolling Hills Covenant Church on the Peninsula but left when he heard about the organist position open here at Ascension. He soon became a member and was confirmed here earlier this year.

How did Itchi get involved in playing the organ? He says it all started in the second grade when his teacher taught him to play the recorder. "That plastic flute started it all for me," he said. "I started playing the piano during the fourth grade, and while a sophomore in high school I visited the Old Town Music Hall in El Segundo." From there, he started playing the Mighty Wurlitzer Theater Pipe Organ in high school, while learning to fix, maintain, and repair the instrument under careful direction. He has traveled to nearly every coast of the United States to play on various theater organs. "God has been very gracious to me," he says. "He's opened doors for me, He's kept me safe from the hairy ones, and in trusting Him, He has opened this door for me to stay here at Ascension."
